Caritas in veritate

Through this close link with truth, charity can be recognized as an authentic expression of humanity and as an element of fundamental importance in human relations, including those of a public nature. *Only in truth does charity shine forth*, only in truth can charity be authentically lived. Truth is the light that gives meaning and value to charity.



Caritas in veritate

That light is both the light of reason and the light of faith, through which the intellect attains to the natural and supernatural truth of charity: it grasps its meaning as gift, acceptance, and communion. Without truth, charity degenerates into sentimentality.

In reality, institutions by themselves are not enough, because integral human development is primarily a vocation, and therefore it involves a free assumption of responsibility in solidarity on the part of everyone.

- 85 million people in the EU are materially deprived
- 17% of people in the EU are at risk of poverty
- One out of 10 households in the EU is jobless

Defining the poverty line – 3 approaches

- less than 60 % of the median income



The 'at risk of poverty' indicator identifies all those (households or people) who fall below a certain income threshold, which in the EU has been set at 60% of the median income. Median income is the amount that divides the income distribution into two equal parts, half of people having incomes above the median and half having incomes below the median.



This measure is the best known and quoted indicator as it affords some comparisons with other countries. It does not, however, measure poverty as such, but rather the proportion of people below a certain income threshold who may be ‘at risk of poverty’. Whether persons below the 60 per cent threshold are actually experiencing poverty will depend on a number of factors.

Definition Sen

Amartya Sen: having an income level that does not allow an individual to cover certain basic necessities, taking into account the circumstances and social requirements of the environment

The Commission on the measurement of economic performance and social progress has been created at the beginning of 2008 on French government's initiative.

Increasing concerns have been raised since a long time about the adequacy of current measures of economic performance, in particular those based on GDP figures. Moreover, there are broader concerns about the relevance of these figures as measures of societal well-being, as well as measures of economic, environmental, and social sustainability.

Reflecting these concerns, President Sarkozy has decided to create this Commission, to look at the entire range of issues. Its aim is to identify the limits of GDP as an indicator of economic performance and social progress, to consider additional information required for the production of a more relevant picture, to discuss how to present this information in the most appropriate way, and to check the feasibility of measurement tools proposed by the Commission. Commission's work is not focused on France, nor on developed countries. The output of the Commission will be made public, providing a template for every interested country or group of countries.

The Commission is chaired by Professor Joseph E. Stiglitz, Columbia University. Professor Amartya Sen, Harvard University, is Chair Adviser. Professor Jean-Paul Fitoussi, Institut d'Etudes Politiques de Paris, President of the Observatoire Français des Conjonctures Economiques (OFCE), is Coordinator of the Commission. Members of the Commission are renowned experts from universities, governmental and intergovernmental organisations, in several countries (USA, France, United Kingdom, India). Rapporteurs and secretariat are provided by the French national statistical institute (Insee), OFCE, and OECD.

The Commission held its first plenary meeting on 22 - 23 April 2008 in Paris. It is expected to give in its final report after one year.

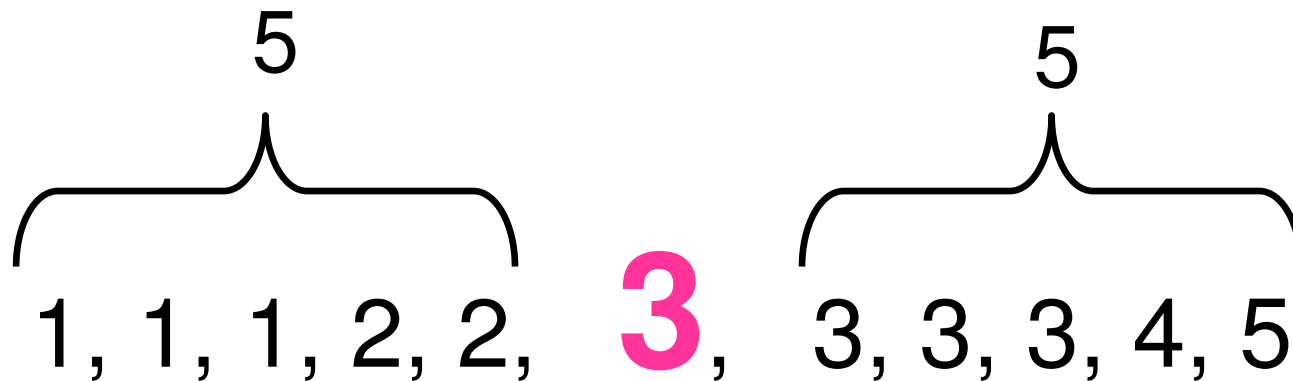

Median Income – Example

11 persons ordered according to their income:



The median income is **3**



The misunderstanding with the median compared to the average

Whereas the average income for the same list of numbers would be:

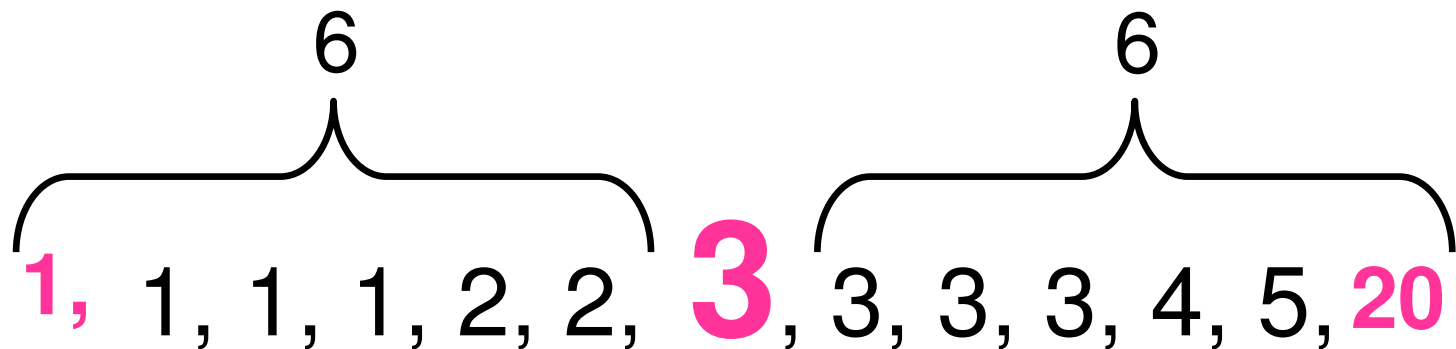
$$(1 + 1 + 1 + 2 + 2 + 3 + 3 + 3 + 3 + 4 + 5) = 28 / 11 = \mathbf{2,45}$$

The average income for the same list of numbers would be :

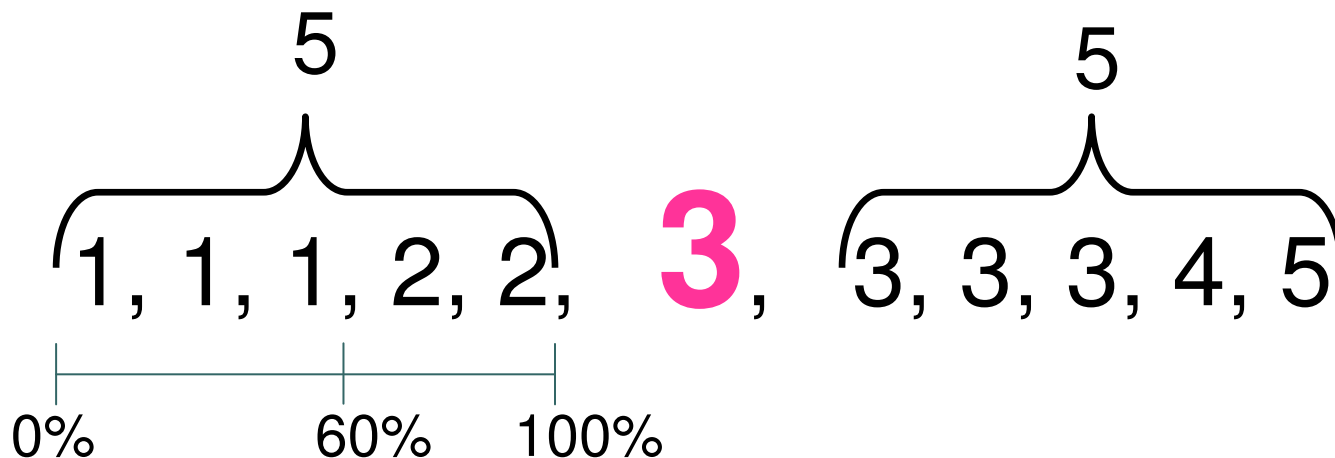

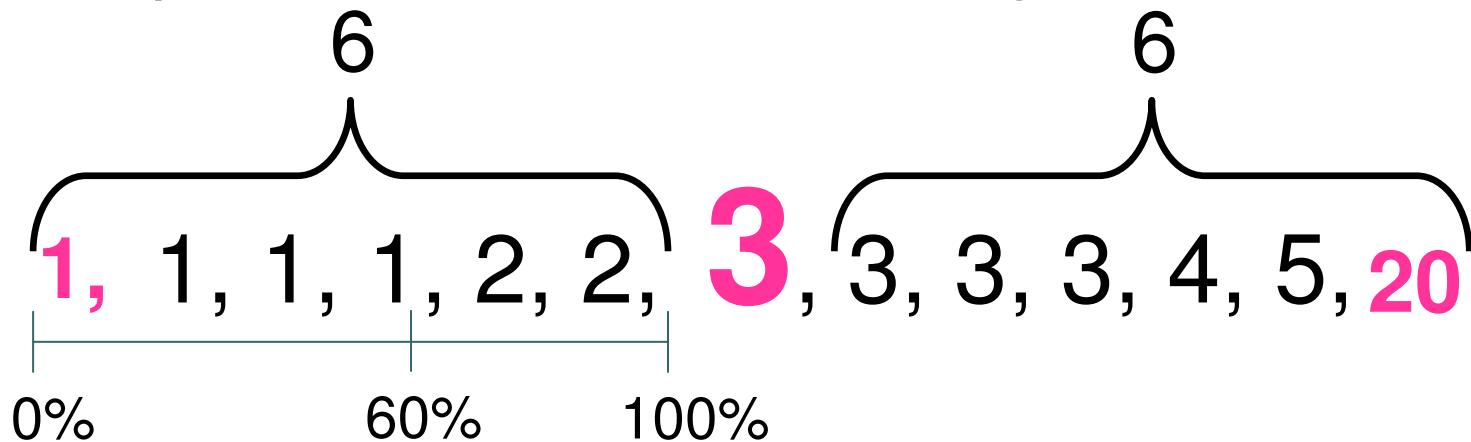

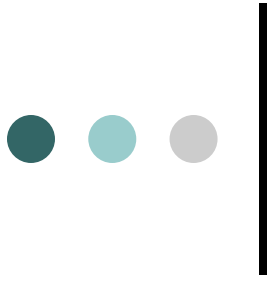

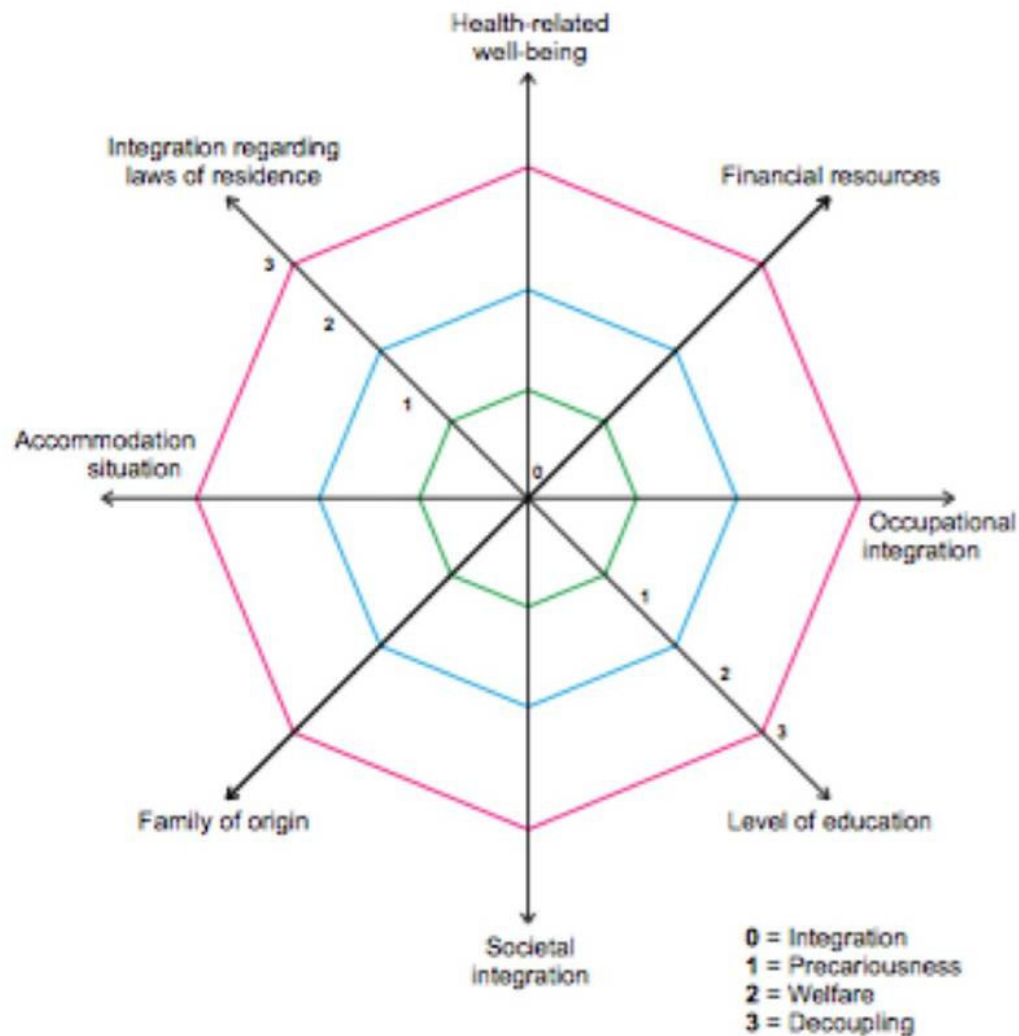

Lack of social contacts

- Social integration describes how well a person is integrated into a network. Indicators of a precarious situation with respect to social integration can be broken family relationships, few social contacts and a withdrawal from social activities.

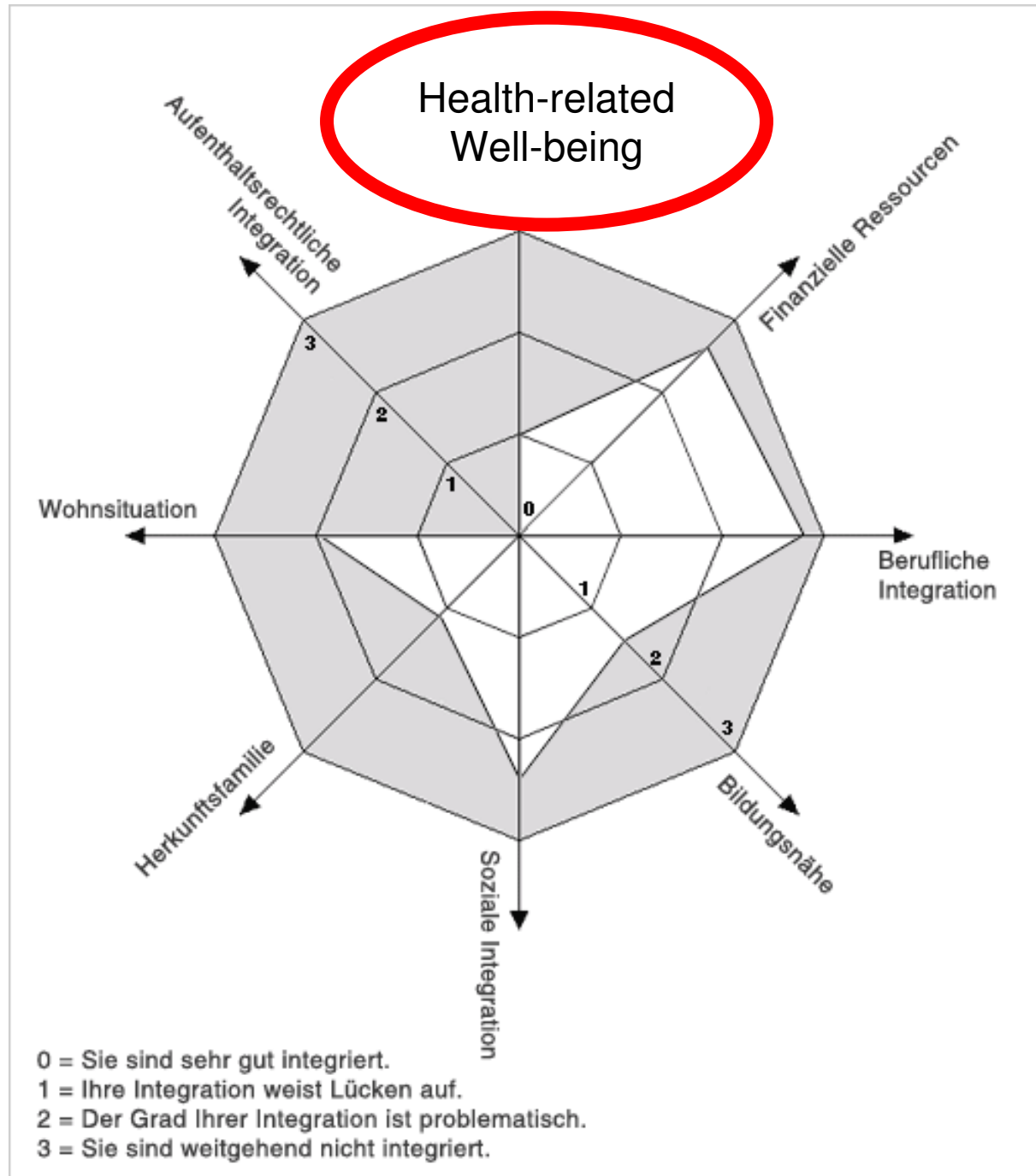


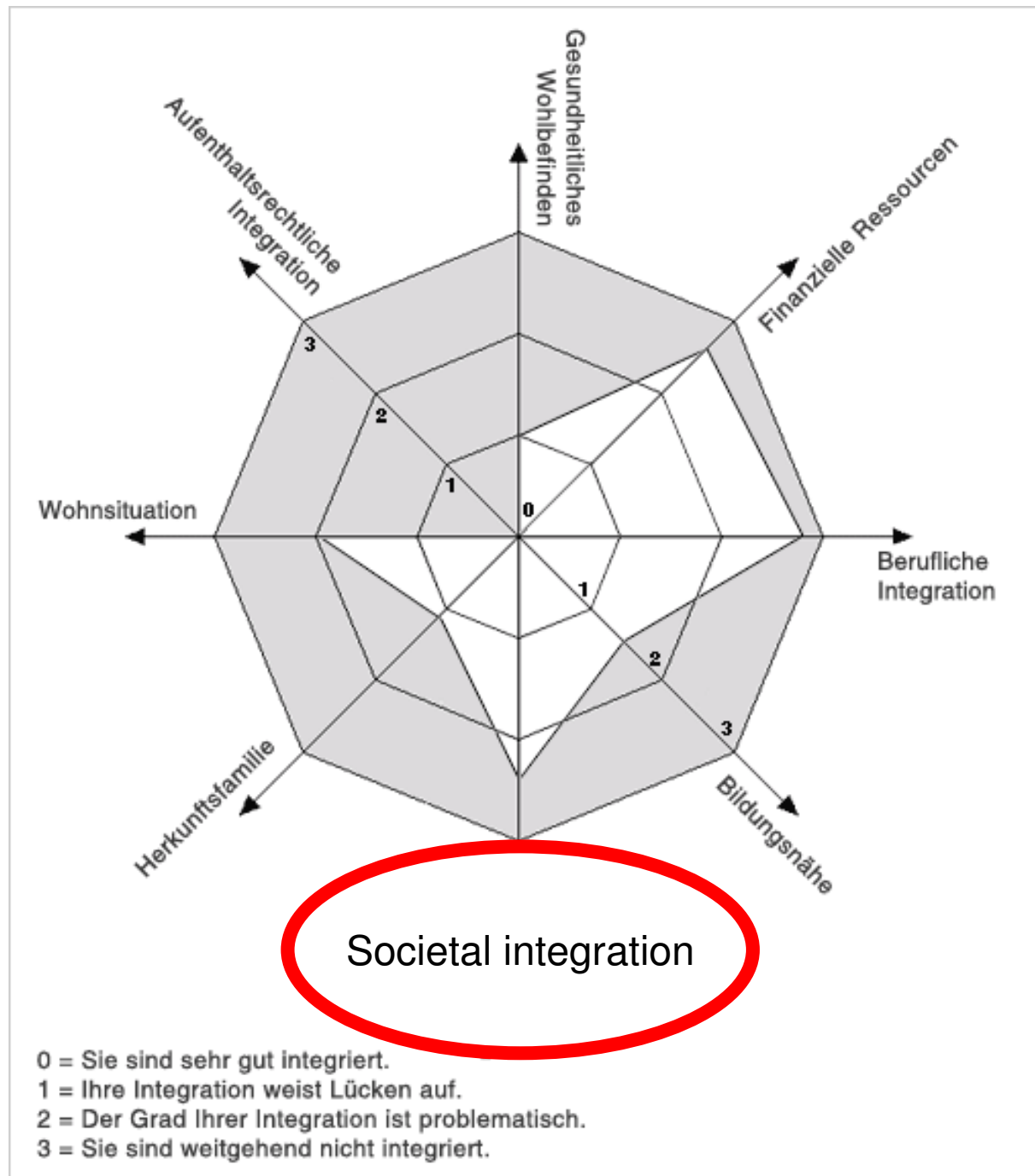
Lack of social contacts

- *“We go on site with **home care services**, we enter people’s homes, their private lives. It is the only service that approaches people in their environment. What are these people’s expectations? At times, they only want you to stay there with them...*

Lack of health

- In practice a person's health-related well-being depends significantly on his/her educational achievements, professional status and income. Those with a low socio-economic status tend to live a less healthy life, are frequently ill or disabled and die younger. Vice versa, illness or an accident can also result in poverty.



Lack of health

- *“The economic crisis has forced about a million people to migrate elsewhere. Those who return cannot find a job or other opportunities of social integration. Many people show signs of depression that affect the well-being of the whole family, the community, the society to a greater extent...” (ALBANIA)*



Lack of self confidence and recognition

- Being self-confident and having self-esteem is especially difficult when living in poverty. Low self-esteem reduces an individual's confidence and the ability to bring positive change into his or her life.



Lack of self confidence and recognition

- *We have observed a poor area along the border and studied 70-odd villages with their populations' needs and especially their opportunities. We have tried to understand the potential of this territory and its population and have transformed this study in a community development project. There is no land without future, only land without projects..." (PORTUGAL)*

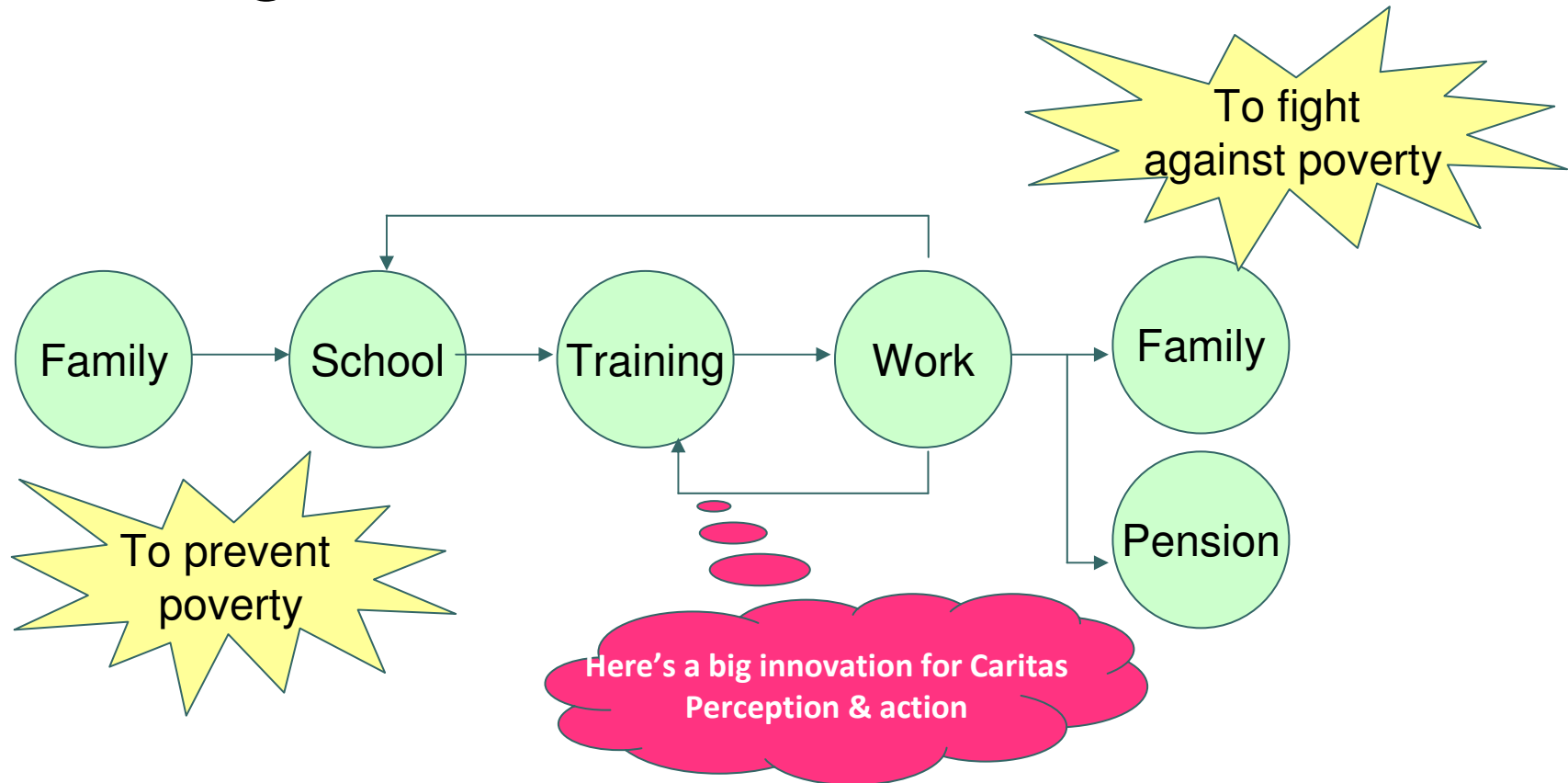

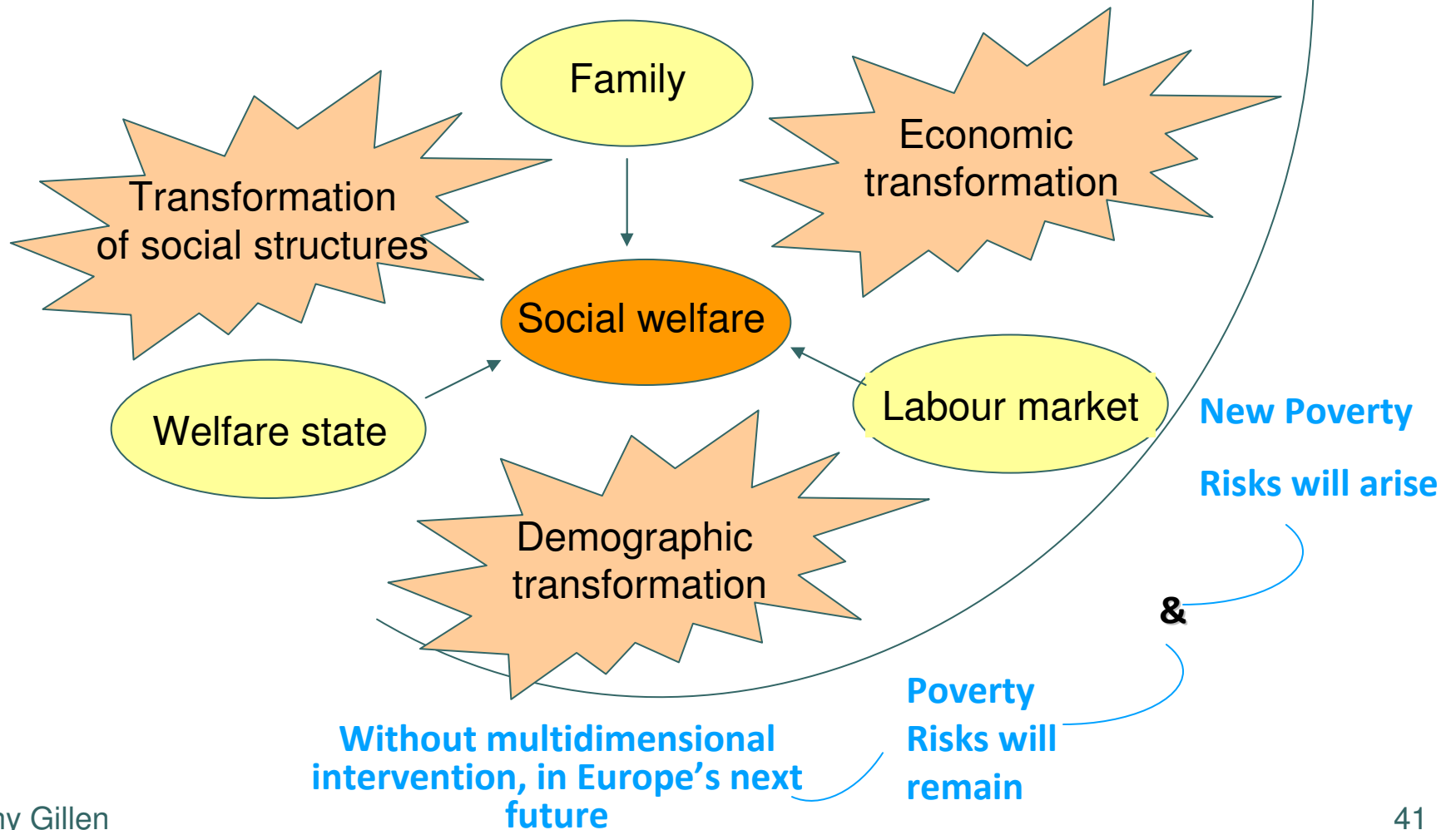


Poverty in the life cycle: to prevent is better than to fight against

Conclusions

- We must continue combating poverty according to the two approaches:
 - poverty AND
 - social inclusion
- Social inclusion must be construed according to the logic of **social justice**, and not only of cohesion.



Social Participation

Our practices and experiences at local, national and EU level showed us that you are not alone if you don't feel alone, and you don't feel alone if you are **recognized** by others and you have the possibility to take part with them in **social life**.

*The best way to prevent poverty, and the best way to fight against it, is **social participation**.*

- The good Samaritan (Lk 10, 27-37)



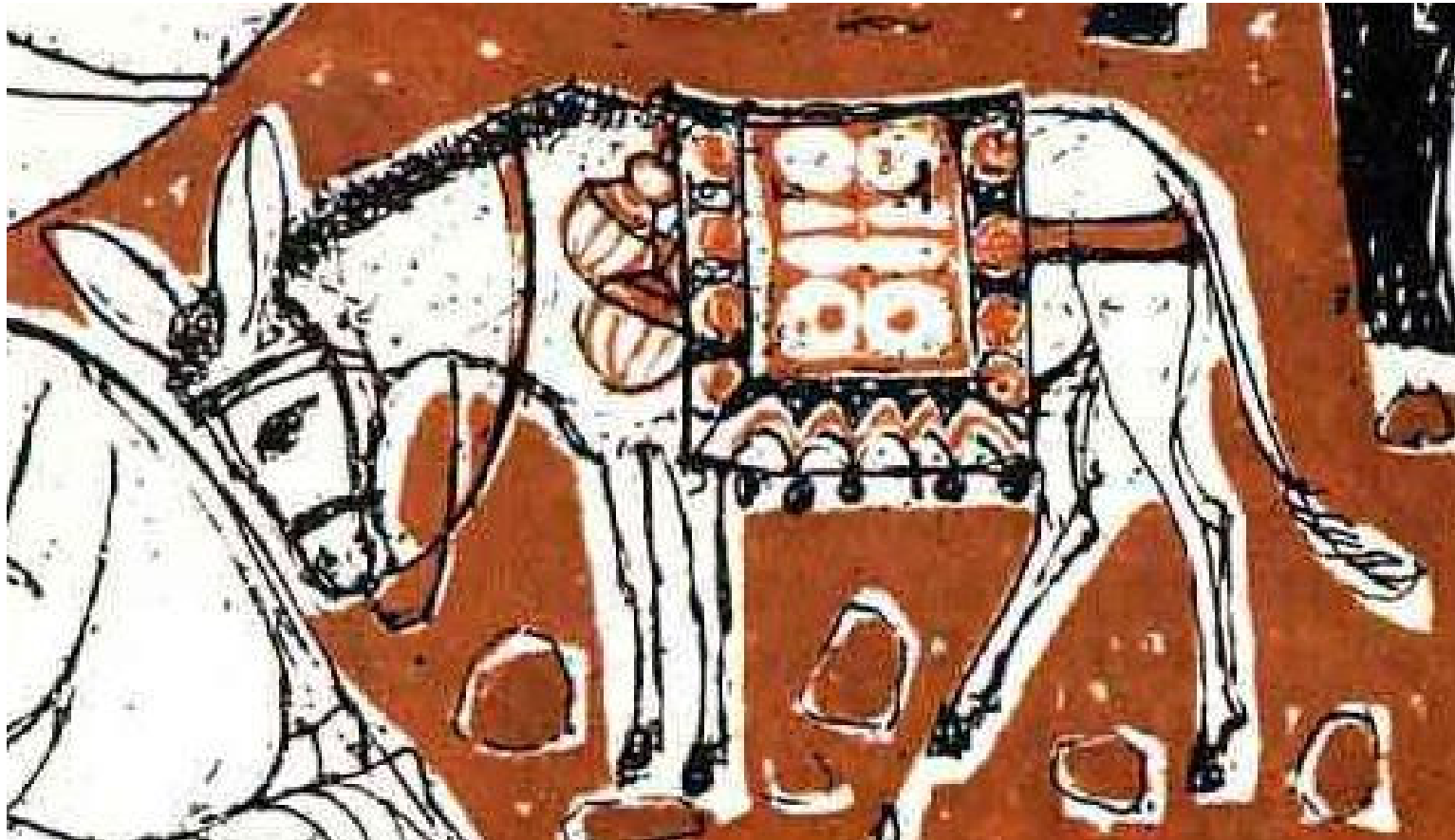
